Eternity: Why Does It Matter?

Core Text: John 3:16

How do we know there is an "eternity" and what difference does it make anyway? What does "life after death" really mean? Is there a real heaven? Is there a real hell? When does eternity start?

We will take the summer to explore what the Bible teaches about abundant life, meaningful life, and eternal life. There is much confusion about eternity in our culture. There is also much confusion within the Christian family about how eternal life actually begins now. Further, there are many Christians who aren't really sure about the realities of heaven and hell. We will explore it during the summer of 2023.

Let me remind us that we are seeking to help our people develop their apologetic skills and learn how to articulate their faith in a way that is both compelling and appealing. Our conversations this summer about eternity will offer us significant opportunities to equip our people in this regard.

A Conversation About Eternity: Apologetics in the Late-Modern Era

With regard to eternity, there continues to be much debate as to how we are to understand it. We are not the first generation to ponder what happens after death. This is an age-old human question that has captured the imaginations of poets, theologians, philosophers, and just about everyone else!

However, we now find ourselves in a certain cultural context that poses challenges for traditional Christian views. And the challenges are not limited to the academy. Conversations about eternity, life after death, ultimate reality—these are "man in the street" encounters. Everyday folks, living everyday lives are engaged in some of the most substantial, consequential dialogues in the modern era. Speaking of "modern", I want us to think together about the realities of modernism, late-modernism, and/or post-modernism as we continue our journey in developing our apologetics muscles.

Ever since the publication of Charles Taylor's, *A Secular Age*, in 2007, many theologians, apologists, and Christian philosophers have been engaged in a significant dialogue in response to the insights explained in this landmark volume. Taylor's argument is rooted in his philosophical discoveries regarding the human self and his Christian worldview guided by his Roman Catholic faith.

Taylor argues that the "secular age" in which we find ourselves is one that is governed by the universal acceptance of the "immanent frame" explanation of reality. In other words, the culture of today no longer accepts the reality of transcendence, and thus, only allows for all explanations of reality to be limited a frame of reference devoid of any existence of a transcendent being like God.

This "immanent frame" context creates all kinds of problems for Christians who seek to share the Gospel with unbelievers. In his book, *Churches and the Crisis of Decline: A Hopeful, Practical Ecclesiology for a Secular Age,* Andrew Root makes this exact point:

Living in the immanent frame requires *a lot* of work for us to see beyond the prescribed cultural map. It's hard to assume that these contingent relations, which give us life, have any direct source in God's own action. It takes a great amount of work for most latemodern Western people to assume that God acts and speaks. Confrontation with a great amount of doubt and suspicion is simply our context, the direct by-product of our frame of reference.

The limitations of "immanent frame" thinking poses problems beyond evangelism for the church today. Churches can lose touch with the transcendent reality of God's presence and begin to assume that its own resources are the source of its life. The main resource of the church is the presence of God through His Holy Spirit, revealed most completely in the Son of God Who is the Head of the church!

We must keep the eternal connection with our God alive in our church. Confession, repentance, worship, prayer, discipleship, the habits of the ordinances, spiritual formation, ministry, obedience to the Great Commandment, obedience to the Great Commission, encounters with the living God, communal realities of God's presence in and through His people ---- these are the true resources of the church!

So, constructing a practical theology of eternity is crucial to the continued health and vitality of the church. We must remain vigilant in instructing and guiding our people towards orthodoxy as we teach essential doctrines and connect them to practical, everyday living. Trevin Wax offers this insight in his new book, *The Thrill of Orthodoxy: Rediscovering the Adventure of the Christian Faith*,

The church faces her biggest challenge not when new errors start to win but when old truths no longer wow. J. R. R Tolkien once said that the most regrettable feature of human nature is how quickly we become unsatisfied with the good. We receive good gifts from God and then grow bored with blessings. Spiritual dullness. Blurry vision. Hardness of heart. *This* is the challenge for the church.

Wax may be right. While our doctrinal teachings may be "old truths" – they still have the capacity to "wow" if they are taught in a way that connects them to real life. Theology has always needed to have practical application and paths towards implementation. Again, the conversations we will have this summer about *eternity* will be important in helping to shape the theological framework of our people. We will seek to help our church members move beyond the limited "immanent frame" thinking and be reminded of the transcendent nature of our faith and the reality of God's presence in our daily lives.

Joshua Chatraw and Mark Allen offer an image that might be constructive for us in their work, *Apologetics at The Cross: An Introduction for Christian Witness,*

A helpful way of understanding the immanent frame is to picture a two-story building. Our premodern ancestors lived in a two-story world. Humans lived on the first level but believed in the existence of a second floor—a higher realm. Theirs was an enchanted world where higher beings were assumed to be active and relevant to the affairs of

everyday life. There was something greater beyond this life, a higher realm of existence that gave meaning and purpose to life. In contrast, today we live in a disenchanted, one-story world that denies the existence of the divine or the supernatural. In much of the West, the commonly shared habits, goals, and symbols of day-to-day life and the meaning commonly ascribed to it point us to the physical world around us and normally no further. Thus, as we inherit these habits, goals, and symbols from our culture, we consciously and subconsciously absorb (through mostly subconsciously) the drive to live for, long for, and learn of things on the first level.

The hope of this series is to remind our church family of the reality of the second floor! Our conversations about eternity should offer instruction and hope for all of us. The Bible has much to say about eternity. In fact, the Bible contains pertinent and significant information about the eternal destinations of heaven and hell. We have to talk about these destinations in our consideration of eternity.

As we lead our church through these meaningful messages about such a relevant topic, we hope to assist them in developing the skill to discuss the reality of eternity intelligently and with an appropriate level of acumen. Our society needs informed Christians who have a clear understanding of the meaning of eternity and its relevance in our everyday lives.

I fully recognize the inherent challenges we face as we seek to lead our people to strengthen their apologetic muscles. We live in a culture that no longer believes in absolute, knowable Truth. The "self" has been enthroned and Truth has been reduced to whatever seems to be true to each individual. So, we know we will be swimming against the cultural tides of relativism and secularism. However, there is much at stake for the church at this point in history. We will forge ahead with conversations about ultimate reality that will both inform and inspire our people.

As we make our way through this series, I will be preaching the first four messages that will set the stage and frame the conversation. During my time away in July, we will hear the voices of guest preachers who will add their unique perspectives to this timely topic. I will assign the texts and provide the path we will all travel over these 9 weeks. I am already praying that God will guide us, our people will be challenged, and our Lord will be magnified!
